

HUYFC Managers code of conduct

- hold or attain the FA Level One coaching qualification.
 - give full details of themselves to the FA via a Criminal Records Bureau disclosure form.
 - must be qualified first-aiders.
 - consistently display high standards of behaviour and appearance and act as a role model for players, parents and spectators.
 - respect the rights, dignity and worth of each and every person and treat them equally within the context of the sport.
 - place the well-being and safety of each player above all other considerations including the development of performance.
 - check and ensure that the playing area and all equipment are safe and fit for purpose before ever training or match event that they conduct.
 - adhere to all guidelines laid down by the constitution and governing bodies (The F.A., County F.A., N.E.H.Y.L. etc.).
 - develop an appropriate working relationship with each player based on mutual trust and respect.
 - encourage and guide players to accept responsibility for their own behaviour and performance.
 - ensure that the activities they direct or advocate are appropriate for the age, maturity, experience and ability of players.
 - always be honest with players, parents and guardians. Clarify with them exactly what is expected of them and also what they are entitled to expect from their Manager / Coach.
 - co-operate fully with other specialists (e.g. other coaches, officials, doctors, physiotherapists) in the best interest of the player.
 - always promote the code of conduct and the positive aspects of the sport (e.g. fair play) to other coaches, players, parents and spectators alike.
 - Never condone violations of the Laws of the Game, or relevant rules and regulations. or the use of prohibited
- Provide a first aid kit. Within this kit must be an up to date listing of each player's home / emergency telephone number, together with any known medical conditions as described in the player's completed HUYFC membership application form.
 - endeavour to attend the appropriate training courses as advised by the club committee.
 - promote ethical principles, avoiding all forms of gamesmanship.
 - pass on complaints regarding match officials to the club secretary, not deal with them personally.
 - encourage and praise the players at all times; never put unnecessary pressure on any player.
 - understand that players each have their own personalities and will respond differently.
 - refrain from smoking in the presence of players whilst conducting training sessions and match-day management of the team.
 - attend a minimum of 6 committee meetings per year.
 - not use or tolerate inappropriate language.
 - not act as an official or unofficial scout for any other football club.
 - not exert undue influence to obtain personal benefit or reward.
 - not show favouritism towards players.
